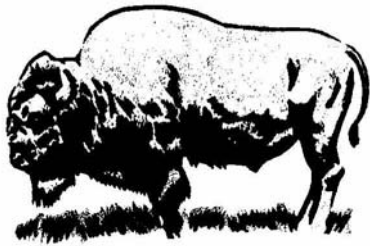

BVFD Notes



It was a busy month around the BVFD the past month. We spent 191 man-hours responding to 39 emergency calls in August. We responded to 28 EMS calls, 3 boat calls, 1 Structure fire, 3 Vehicle Accidents and 4 miscellaneous calls for alarm malfunctions and a gas leak. This brings our total calls for 2009 to 219. The members also spent 24 man-hours performing station and vehicle maintenance with their assigned duty crew.

The BVFD has a new look. I mentioned a few months ago that through a grant from the Scott County Regional Authority we were getting a new First Response Vehicle. Well, all of the pieces have come together, and the new vehicle has been placed in service. You will see this vehicle responding to EMS and grass fire calls.

CLERK'S CORNER

The City Election is this fall and after the submission of petitions we have seven people running for council and this means we will have to hold a **Primary election on October 6th** to narrow it down to six. After the primary we will have the **regular election on November 3rd**. If you are not registered to vote, need an absentee ballot, or have any questions please contact City Hall or the County Auditor's Office. Get out and make YOUR VOTE count! River Action proposed the installation of a rain garden in front of the BAC to help with water run off and provide a better looking landscape. The project will begin in the next couple of weeks. During this time frame if you need to visit City Hall you will need to use the North entrance by the park or the South entrance by the gym. Sorry for the inconvenience.

The fall clean up dates are October 7, 8, & 9. You can take items directly to the landfill or to the roll off dumpsters that will be located in the Community Center parking lot. If you need help loading your items please contact city hall 381-2226.

The Council had a busy agenda this month. Mr. Basso from Upper Mississippi Fleet invited the City to the christening of their new boats; one of which will be named "City of Buffalo". Council appointed Horst the Safety Director for employees. The date for Trick or Treat is October 30 from 6pm-8pm. Last but not least public works will be hiring a full time employee to replace a position lost by retirement.

The Iowa Open Burning Law, and Buffalo City code allows you to burn items that are grown on your property only. The fire must be watched and under control and cannot infringe on a neighbors right to clean air. In addition, recreational fires are also allowed. No garbage or construction materials are to be burnt.

Building permits are required to construct, enlarge, alter, repair, move, demolish, or change the occupancy of a building or structure, including electrical work, plumbing, heating and AC projects. Permit applications are available at City Hall or on the website. If you have any questions about Building permits or the Building Code, please contact the **new Building Inspector Tod Thiele** at City Hall 381-2226.

Helen Keller once said, "I am only one. I can not do everything, but still I can do something; I will not refuse to do something I can do"

This saying speaks to each and everyone of us.. I am reminded of how unique each and every one of us individually are. How powerful is one person with a goal shared with all other people who will open their hearts and minds.

Chad Pregracke was a graduate of local ILLinois high school. He loved the Mississippi River and knew that other people shared his love of the Mississippi River. When he came to Buffalo Iowa, He found people who loved the River. Together the people of Buffalo, Iowa supported the clean up of the beach and their area of the Mississippi. Their hard work and passion and pride in their Town and the Mississippi River moved the spirits and souls of more people to help clean up the River. Following the lead of one Iowa boy who has become the young man with a goal big enough to embrace all of us... the people of Buffalo were big part of the foundation of this goal.

You may say I am only one. You may say I can not do every thing. You may say but still I can do something.

You will not refuse to do the something that you can do. I am 63 years old. I can not join in the cleaning of the old tires out of the river by hard labor. I did do something that I could do = I did bake cupcakes for the crew last year and give them to Chad and his crew. After the days work by all those wonderful real folks, the people who joined him cleaning up the river near Davenport, had joined together for a meal..had left for that day there was more to do. I could not work all day.. I could not keep going after the meal and go back to tidy up.

Few People realized that Chad and his crew did go back out in their boats and kept working getting the piles of trash, tires, debris that so many people had gathered out of the river to the last of the clean up =moved hauled and picked up to tidy up. I did a small thing that I could do// I simply brought a snack for them to eat back out on their boats .. Chad said something about how he appreciated the cupcakes and how he and his crew would turn that energy into the rest of the project of cleaning up the river before dark that day.

When all of those hard working people who had so willingly did something they could do for that day..had finished their part...I did what I could do.. They could not work all week but they did give one day of their days off to happily work hard for the passion and pride of cleaning up the Mississippi River. All of those people together and one by one had done an amazing thing..

Chad and his crew had stayed and focused on finishing the end of the day on the clean up project of the Mississippi River.

Chad's simple statement of appreciation was very big hearted for a small treat. Still I had found there was something I could do. I could not refuse to do something that I could do. You are also going to find something that you could do to help this big idea of the Living Lands and Waters. Some of you are strong and healthy and willing to give that day off to hard labor. Some of you are going to donate needed items to the crew and workers. Some of you are going to donate time, money for the repairs and fuel for the barges and boats, some are going to go to the beaches and boats with the goals of keeping the rivers clean..

Some of you are going to pass the words of encouragement, and pride and passion to keep the river clean by telling others to join in keeping the river clean. When you say let's don't toss our cans into the river, let's do bring out trash off the boats, let's do plant the trees, let's do use the garbage /trash barrels on the beach. You are doing what you can do to keep growing the pride and the spirit of your love for the Mississippi River waters and beaches and living lands. Buffalo was one of the first towns to participate and to have the growing pride and spirit as this community of wonderful people came out in the beginning of Chad's goal of clean up the river day by day to show their love of the Mississippi River. I am a small person I donated a bit of time and also took some of the snacks to the folks who were coming back to the parking areas and encouraged them and told the that I did appreciate the work that they had done..They were hungry and needed a bit of food...and maybe a bit of encouragement and appreciation and they did not know me nor need to.. You also encourage and show appreciation in

passing the words and deeds, and the simple actions, you can do something each and every one of you to keep the goal alive and help the Living Lands and Waters.

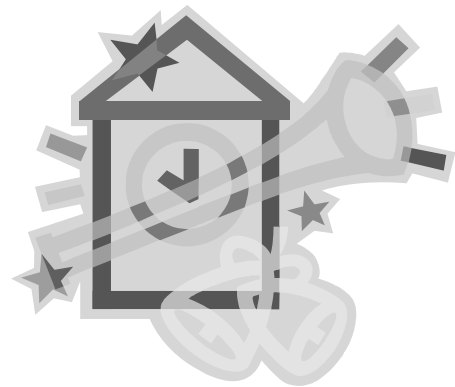
